As part of English this week we have continued our story writing. The children wrote the start of their story using the story language 'In a land far away...' and the build-up of their story which began with 'It was a _____ morning...'.

Can your child re-tell you the 'start' of their story?


Can your child tell you the story language we use for the 'build up' of a story?

As part of Maths this week children have started learning about time. We revisited the 'days of the week' and 'months of the year' before looking at our daily routines. Children sequenced pictures to show the order they would usually do things for example, first get up, then have breakfast, after that go to school.


Can your child name something they do in between lunchtime and bedtime?

We then learnt how to tell the time on an analogue clock. In Year 1, we learn to tell the time to the hour and half past the hour.

Please look at the information below with your child.




The minute hand is longer than the hour hand.

As part of topic lessons, children have started their Art learning about sculptures. In their first lesson they learnt how to use Modroc by cutting strips, dipping it into water and removing the excess water. They then practised this by applying Modroc to a small cardboard box or screwed up piece of newspaper. Later in the week, they got into groups and started sculpting their exotic snakes, again, using Modroc!

Homework

In addition to the spellings, children will be tested on a sentence containing the words. However, the sentence will not be sent home. This is to see if they can apply the spelling currently within their writing. Can you get your child to practise applying the words by creating their very own sentences?

Reading Diaries

Children in KS1 have all been provided with a Home Reading Diary. Please fill this in daily based on your child reading a couple of pages of a book or a whole book. Please return the Reading Diary to school each day and leave it in their book bags. There are books situated in the classroom for your child to take home daily. Reading is extremely

important to your child's development so we really encourage your child to read a book or pages of a book daily. If you are unsure of your child's reading book colour then please ask your teacher.
